FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE FREEDOM OF MOVEMENT DURING COVID-19

Q: Do I have the right to freedom of movement?

A: Yes; this right is guaranteed by the **Constitution of Jamaica**

Q: Is this right to freedom of movement guaranteed at all times?

A: No. The Constitution allows our freedom of movement to be limited "for the purpose of dealing with situations that exist during a period of public emergency or public disaster".

Q: Is COVID-19 a Public Disaster?

A: Yes. The Constitution defines a public disaster as the occurrence of any earthquake, hurricane, flood, fire, outbreak of pestilence, "outbreak of infectious disease or other calamity". This definition makes the COVID-19 pandemic a public disaster.

Q: Can the Law limit our freedom of movement during COVID-19?

A: Yes. The Constitution allows the government to limit our freedom of movement during a crisis like COVID-19. It allows for the limited movement

of persons to curtail the spread of "an infectious or contagious disease constituting a serious threat to public health".

Also, the **Disaster Risk Management Act 2015** allows the Prime Minister (PM) to declare "*the whole, or part of Jamaica, a disaster area*". The Act allows the PM to restrict our movement, if necessary, to manage the disaster. So, the government making certain orders such as the islandwide curfew is to reduce the spread of COVID-19.



Q: Can we be punished for breaching the COVID-19 provisions?

A: Yes; If you breach the COVID-19 orders, like the island-wide curfew, you can be imprisoned or fined.

The Disaster Risk Management Act allows the Police to arrest and charge those who breach the Act, or the regulations or orders made under it. The Act imposes a maximum fine of \$J1million or up to 12 months' imprisonment.

Q: If detained during the COVID-19 curfew, do I have any rights?

A: Yes; Persons arrested/detained have the following rights:

- The right to speak with and be visited by family, religious counsellor & a doctor;
- The right to be told, as soon as possible, the reason for arrest/ detention; &
- The right to have an Attorney
- The right to a court hearing at the earliest possible time
- The right to not to be charged and held in custody for over 24 hours without bail being granted or refused

Q: What should I do in this COVID-19 time during curfew?

A: Everyone has a duty to stay home during curfew. The curfew is put in place to protect us all from the threat of COVID-19.

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
